

ROAD REPORTS

Longtime Vag. member George Conlon who lives south of Ensenada forwarded this to Board member Mark Martinez to update road conditions. From Tijuana down Mex. 1 prior to the toll road about 3.5 miles down is a sink hole so you go down to 1 lane each way, the first toll booth is unmanned (free toll). Going down toll road at mile 49, around the Mirador is bridge construction and goes for about 5 miles and is down to single lane each way.

South of Ensenada 3 lanes merge in to 1 lane at around mile 72 & continues until about mile 75. All this said it took about total time about 2 1/2 hours, border through the final road construction. Best time to go south bound would be in the am, as it gets busy around 2:00 pm, going north bound after around 10:00 am. This report was on June 19th, 2023.

I have just travelled from Mexicali to Bahia de Los Angeles and I'm currently in Loreto. The roads are in pretty good shape. Highway 5 is in good shape, a pothole or two but absent are the long stretches of bad road.

Highway 1 to the turn off for Bahia de Los Angeles is fine. The road up to Bahia de Los Angeles is showing its age with a few rough spots.

All the washouts have been repaired. Continuing south on Highway 1 to Guerrero Negro, you still encounter some rough spots.

South of the turnoff for Santa Rosalillita there are sections where potholes (shallow) cannot be avoided due to the narrow road. Slow down and you'll be fine.

Road report (continued)

Between Guerrero Negro and Vizcaino significant road construction is taking place. There are three long, rough, dusty detours. Each detour is over a mile in length. After Vizcaino there are no significant bad road conditions. There is some repair work going on with flagmen directing traffic, but no problems.

Every military checkpoint we encountered were brief and professional.

BAJA EXPLORER 2023 October 10 - November 2

Wagon Master Vice President Scott McEwen is planning to explore the entire Baja peninsula at a leisurely pace, enjoying beautiful beaches, ancient missions, and the welcoming Baja culture. This adventure will include six meals, at least two adventure tours, a guided tour of San Javier Mission and the possibility of swimming with whale sharks. October 22: We begin our journey headed north, return to La Paz and Campestre Maranatha RV.


October 23: Return to Loreto and Rivera Del Mar.

BEACHES AND WHALES CARAVAN

We will be returning to Baja to explore this beautiful country and interact with the magnificent California Gray Whales. This is an incredible experience. Imagine being able to touch and pet these giant mammals that swim right up to the boat. We will travel out to the lagoon where the calves are born and observe the mothers and babies from a panga boat, an amazing experience. We will also visit missions and explore beautiful beaches, enjoy four group meals (included) and a guided, escorted trip to San Javier Mission near Loreto. This caravan drives at a leisurely pace and makes frequent rest stops. The group is limited to eight RVs, so not to overwhelm to local services.

February 17: We will gather at the Desert Trails RV Resort in El Centro, where we will introduce ourselves and discuss driving and safety matters.

February 18: We will cross the border into Mexico at the Mexicali Port of Entry (POE) and travel south to San Felipe where we will make a brief stop for fuel and groceries. Our first night in Mexico will be on the shore of the Sea of Cortez in Puertecitos at Octavio's Camp. Dry camping.

February 19: On to Guerrero Negro and Malarrimos RV. That evening, we will enjoy a group meal at the onsite restaurant.

March 3: San Felipe, relaxing, shopping and just enjoying our last day of the adventure.

March 4: Head to the border and back to the USA. After being processed at the US Customs, we'll gather together to say our goodbyes. Always bitter-sweet.

Mark and Faith Martinez will be leading a whale and beach camping tour February 25 – March 7, 2024. This trip will be open to RVers and those without RV's.

February 25: Meet in San Diego (location to be determined).

February 26: Cross border at Tijuana and travel to El Rosario (RV lot and hotel available or dry camping).

February 27: Leave El Rosario and travel to Guerrero Negro.

February 27 – 29: Dry camping on beach at Ojo de Libre lagoon, 10–15 miles south of Guerrero Negro.

March 1: Back to Guerrero Negro to stay overnight at Malarrimos campground. (RV full hook-up to dump etc.).

March 2 – 4: Leave Guerrero Negro to Bahia de Los Angeles (dry camping) Sea of Cortez side. (RV and Hotel available)

March 5 – 7: Leave Bahia de Los Angeles and head to San Felipe Sea of Cortez side. (RV and Hotel available)

March 8: Cross back into the US through Mexicali.

Most days are in the vicinity of 200 miles, approximately 5 to 6 hours' drive time.

The administration cost to the Vagabundos is \$450, plus any pre-paid RV/Hotel reservations that would have to be made through the Vagabundos office. All other camping, whale watching, etc. is pay as you go. A \$200 deposit should be made no later than September 15, 2023, to hold your spot and payable to Vagabundos del Mar. Please contact the office for membership and Mexican vehicle insurance (sticking to the schedule, you would need for two weeks).

For any other questions, contact the Vagabudos office and they will forward directly to Mark Martinez.

The last two years that Mark and Faith have been at the Guerrero Negro lagoon has been fantastic. One year we got to hold a cannon ball jellyfish which is not there every year.

I would like to offer to the club members, if you are staying, passing through, or interested in Loreto. I would offer my knowledge and hopefully answer any questions you might have prior to your visit or in Loreto regarding restaurants/bars, shopping, banking, car mechanic, RV sites, fishing, etc. Or any other questions you might have. Unfortunately, I'm not familiar with the hotels/resorts south of Loreto such as Loreto Bay and Villa del Palmar. It is the joy of sharing my knowledge of Loreto to those interested. OUR 2022 SAILBOAT JOURNEY

Here is my recount of 7 weeks and over 2000-mile shake-down cruise on Resolute a 2007 J/122. We have horses but I traded in my horse for a sailboat:

We joined the 2022 Baja Ha-ha with myself and a crew of 3 after finalizing the purchase of the boat a week before. Good start to Tortuga with the big blue spinnaker flying high. Calm weather and seas to Bahia Santa Maria. As we left the bay, we had good wind to Cabo San Lucas as we sailed all the way into Los Cabos Marina. We changed crew, and made our way to Bahia Los Frailes, Los Muertos, and to Isla Sprito Santo with good weather. Our next port was La Paz as we said goodbye to Dixie, then it was just the two of us as we returned to the islands north of La Paz and calm bays. Beautiful weather at the Cape and up to islands north Sprito Santo, Partigas fishing, exploring, snorkeling. It was cruising at its best.

We returned south to Los Cabos where my wife Nancy flew home, and I greeted Gary Clark from TX (He helped bring Medicine Man back from Transpac in 2019 when I had to dive under the boat to cut a net off the prop) for the bash back up the coast. We had calm weather and seas up to Tortuga where the forecast north was 22kts. As we had motor sailed through 20 kts on the way up, Gary needed to get back and we didn't consider it too extreme. We headed up to the south end of Cedros Island on December 7th and noticed in the distance a sailboat close to the island not making headway with calm winds. Just then we heard a distress call requesting help from a frantic young woman. We responded and were informed that they had picked up a fish trap line and tangled it in the prop and were dead in the water.

We approached Motion, a 36' S/V, with Derick and Nicky on board and advised to douse the sails. It was apparent from Nicky's emotional plea; this could end their journey. With Gary at the helm and Resolute circling Motion, I prepared to go in the water with a mask and fins. I dove under the disabled boat and freed up the entanglement. I requested a mechanical verification of the drive system while in and under the water. After the confirmation, I swam over to their stern as they expressed their gratitude. My final statement to them was "Sometimes you just need to COWBOY UP".

Sailboat Journey (continued)

As we continued on and made our way up the inside of Cedros Island, the wind started picking up. We motored across Bahis Sabastian Vazcaino with now 26kts on the nose and 8-to-10-foot seas and a short swell duration. I can recall changing clothes in the V-berth and experiencing free fall as we crested over a swell and slammed in the trough. I would later look back at Gary at the helm as water blasted over the dodger hitting Gary in the face and drenching him. We finally made it to San Carlos at night for anchorage and a good night's sleep. We concluded our trip with Gary in Ensenada arriving at night going through a Christmas boat parade running aground in the mud and with a final side tie at Baja Naval. As we got closer to the port In Ensenada, the radio traffic was unbearable and the VHF radio turned down (this would later be a mistake), Gary took a bus back to San Diego as I stayed with the boat during a haul out for bottom paint.

Nancy joined me again for the trip back to San Pedro where we had an uneventful ride up the coast. That is until we crossed the border. We used the CBP ROAM app to report our entry to the USA as it was acknowledged with a PENDING. Our boat does have AIS but as an offshore racer, there is an unidentified switch at the nav station to disable this feature and unbeknownst to us. turned off. So, with no AIS and the VHF volume down to nothing, we proceeded past Point Loma where I noticed on my radar an 85-foot USCG cutter sitting 15 miles offshore at 1:00 at night. We passed the cutter as it followed us about 5 miles off our stern. The cutter stopped and launched a tender where they came up to our stern and requested us to come to a stop and prepare to be boarded. With 4 fully armed USCG personnel, they boarded and proceeded to check the bilge and engine. We were informed that we were under suspicion as our AIS was not activated and there was no reply when we were hailed on the VHF. The boarding resulted in a inspection that was completed safety successfully passed. We continued on our way and made it back to our home port in San Pedro, California.

This journey resulted in several lessons learned to be added to the docket under "Boating Experience" and if you don't see the local fisherman going out in pangas, the weather may be a little more than you bargained for.

BRINGING YOUR FURRY FRIENDS TO BAJA

I have been asked many times about traveling with dogs and cats in Baja. I have brought my two little sidekicks with me on a few adventures without any issues. I know people who are regular Baja travelers and wouldn't think of leaving their dog at home. There are a few things to consider when planning on having the company of your furry friends in Baja.

Prior to a trip with my dogs, I visit our Vet and update any needed vaccinations. I ask for an updated printout of their shot record that the Vet is glad to produce. In past years a Certificate of Health was required, but that is no longer needed. I have never been asked for any documentation by either the Mexican or US Customs when crossing the border. The only comment has been, "what cute dogs".

I also purchase from our vet a prescription flea and tick medicine. I have read reports of an outbreak of Rickettsia, spread by fleas, ticks, lice and mites in Baja, mostly in the larger cities. There have been 17 deaths reported, mostly children. That is why I protect my animals with a prescription flea and tick medicine.

I attach identification tags to their collars in the event we get separated. I do not know if micro-chips can be read in the smaller Baja towns, so the tag made at Walmart is a good idea.

I bring my own dog food as my mutts are finicky eaters. Your regular dog food might not be available in Mexico. Dry food is mostly sold from open bags that you have to scoop out into a paper bag.

I was walking my dogs in the campground and met a couple who also was traveling with their dog. They advised me that when in Mexicali, they were issued a traffic ticket because their dog was not tethered or in a crate. They believed this was a shake down and went to the police station where they were shown the penal code establishing the statue. No shake down, fine...\$100.00 US.!! I do not know if this is only effective in Mexicali, or the entire State of Baja. Just beware and figure out how to avoid being pulled over. I put my guys in the back seat and raise the center console so they can't jump into the front seat.

My next trip I'm bringing their crates, better safe than sorry. One last observation. There are many dogs running the streets throughout Baja. Not all are friendly and might approach you as you're walking your dog. You have to be prepared. I normally will stay close to where I'm camping, staying mostly within the campground. Some people will carry a walking stick when out with their pooch, just FYI.

I really enjoy traveling with my dogs and will not hesitate to return to Baja with them. Over the course of many Baja caravans, we have not had any serious dog mishaps. They are always entertaining at the campfire and make great traveling companions.

Dogs and kids, always welcome!!

REGISTERING GOLF CARTS

South Dakota is no longer registering golf carts (low speed electric vehicles) for use in Mexico. They term they use is "low speed electric vehicles."

I checked with several other states, but they require you to appear in person. Then I called the North Dakota Department of Motor Vehicles and they said they would register low speed vehicles if you had proof of liability insurance and paid the fees, etc. I told them I only have Mexican insurance and they said that was no problem. It seems like they are easy-going. They did specify to send a photo of the VIN number. But I think it's best to send as much documentation as possible.

Spring La Paz Clinic 2023 Paul and Shelley Boe

Hola Vagabundos,

Our latest spring clinic in La Paz provided the following legs and braces to the people of Baja California:

6 Left above knee prostheses

3 Left below knee

6 Right above knee.

3 Left below knee

1 pair SMOS (aka ankle/foot brace)

1 AFO (aka below knee or short leg brace)

1 KAFO Repair (aka above knee or long leg brace)

We had a total of 65 total patient visits and were visited by patients from as far away as Mexicali, Bahía Asunción, Santa Rosalia, and Loreto, to name a few.

I've been retired since 2003, and so I've been out of the loop for quite a while, but I'm pretty sure the value of these systems is over \$200K in today's dollars.

I am hopeful that our clinic can continue, especially with the "new blood." (The volunteers that have joined over the last few years.) One of the new volunteers, Doug Pinkley CPO (Certified in Prosthetics and Orthotics by the American Board for Certification in Prosthetics and Orthotics) has started a 501 (c) (3) in hopes that we can generate some funding to help defray the clinic costs.

Here's how it's worked since 2004:

Volunteers pay for their own transportation to and from the clinic. The La Balandra Rotary Club of La Paz provides the lodging and the daily lunches at the clinic. All other associated costs (meals, entertainment, margaritas, non-recyclable materials for fabrication, etc) are borne by the volunteers themselves. All other parts/supplies are from recycling old prostheses (artificial limbs) and orthoses (orthopedic braces for the back, neck, limbs and head-non dental) that we get from our many contacts in the states.

So, here's my pitch... If one quarter or one third of the folks who are members of the Vagabundos del Mar travel club could donate just a few bucks, we could fund the clinic at least into the 2030's. And even though you may not know me from Adam, I can honestly guarantee that ALL donations, 100%, go directly to the clinic, NO administrative expenses, NO officers' salaries, NO BS, NADA.




